As part of the evaluation of the ACE funded, 40 Artist Educator resources, AccessArt has joined forces with Cambridge School of Art at Anglia Ruskin University to bring a workshop programme of visiting visual artists or 'creative practitioners' into four Cambridgeshire schools.

VIVID Young Creatives set out to give year eight students the opportunity to meet and work with a practicing visual artist in a workshop session. AccessArt and VIVID aimed to use the workshops as a springboard for opening debate around approaches to facilitating creative opportunities for young people and broadening the ambition of projects and

opportunities within the school curriculum.
